Participant fields represented a wide range of disaster-focused scholarship and practice including anthropology, sociology, geography, law, and policymaking in federal agencies. Focus of workshop: to develop a new methodology for reducing suffering of survivors by integrating theoretical and practical knowledge about how bureaucratic decision-making occurs in relation to survivors.
