






Attendee Sectors
















Ways to Contribute

- Panelists—including moderators and speakers—receive a \$50 registration discount
















Selection Process

- Workshop Planning Committee reviews and scores all submissions.
- What We Look For:
 - Clear and novel ideas that cover multiple perspectives related to a given topic.
 - Ideas and panels that include diverse perspectives.
 - High quality, professional, and well-written submissions.
 - Speaker expertise on topic submitted.
 - Conversations that would benefit the field to discuss and debate together.
- Due to large number of submissions and limited space, even those that score well during the review process may not be accepted. Sometimes we also combine submissions.

We identify which
session ideas fit

roundtables, etc.)
and topics we seek
to address

We often receive submissions that were not submitted together but have similar themes. In these cases, we combine ideas into a single session.

Once we've refined the session topics and presenters, we notify everyone and work with moderators and presenters to ensure each session is a success!






